The Stillwater Fire Department is a professional municipal department, comprised of 74 uniformed personnel and 2 non-uniformed, serving a jurisdiction of 32 square miles within Stillwater city limits and an estimated population of 49,000 and Oklahoma State University campus with an enrollment of more than 20,000. The fire service area includes all of Payne County and parts of Noble, Pawnee and Lincoln counties with a combined population of approximately 82,000.





2021 Accomplishments

- Provided a second set of bunker gear for all front line firefighters
- Provided a new set of wildland / rescue gear for all firefighters.
- Placed new Pierce ladder truck into operational service.
- Implemented compliance engine to assist the Fire Marshall's office.
- Implemented a new awards program.
- Placed new thermal imaging cameras into operational service.
- Added new protocols for investigations, funerals, awards and commendations, and high fire danger days.
- Designed and ordered two Pierce Engines to replace Engine-1 and Engine-4.
- Developed and implemented a Chief's newsletter to improve communication from administration to the company level.
- Sent two of our members to the National Fire Academy.

2021 Accomplishments, Continued.

- Made improvements to our facilities to include:
 - New HVAC units at station 2, 4, and Fire Admin.
 - Replaced showers at fire station one.
 - Replaced the entire back ramp behind station one.
 - Replaced a bay heater at fire station one.
 - Replaced the main sewer line at fire station three.
 - Replaced a gear washer extractor at fire station one.



2021 Wet Down Ceremony

In August, the Stillwater Fire Department hosted a wet down ceremony to welcome our new Pierce 107 foot Ladder Truck. The wet down ceremony event is a tradition celebrated by fire departments to commission new fire apparatus by anointing it with water sprayed from the retiring fire truck.



Training



8,300 total hours of training.

SFD SFD is always training. Training is critical to the success in carrying out the mission of the Stillwater Fire Department to protect our community. The Training Division supervises, and coordinates the Department training programs to ensure the Department is prepared for any and all emergencies. Examples of these training programs include EMS, Fire, Rescue, and Haz-Mat Operations.

The Training Division is led by the Chief of Training who is responsible for the overall administration and management of the Fire Department Training Program. This includes compliance with applicable federal, state and local mandates while producing meaningful training sessions aimed at personal and professional development.

In 2021 the members of the Stillwater Fire Department completed over 8,300 hours of training.





2021 Public Education

The Stillwater Fire Department is responsible for educating the public about fire safety and fire prevention. This year, we were able to participate in back to school events, car seat checks, show and tells, career fairs, station tours, and more. SFD was also able to visit all 6 Stillwater Public Schools for Fire Prevention Week 2021.


